
# 2020-A Year in Review

2020 proved to be a trying year for a multitude of reasons. The pandemic created new challenges for the police department and certain adjustments were made to continue providing the Frankfort community with a high level of service. Traffic statistics for 2020 were reduced in comparison to previous years due to procedural changes for COVID-19. Our officers did a tremendous job of responding to community concerns and providing services despite the pandemic.

Burglaries to motor vehicles continued to occur in Frankfort, as well as, throughout Illinois and the nation. The Illinois Department of Employment Security (IDES) scam became one of our most prominent calls. This is evident in the number of identity theft cases reported this year, the vast majority were related to IDES fraud. This statewide scam occurs when an individual receives unsolicited unemployment benefits through the IDES. The benefits are typically arriving in the form a notice sent to an employer or an unemployment benefits card unexpectedly arriving in the mail. We recommend those who have been a victim of this scam monitor their credit to detect any additional breaches in personal information. Officers Smock and Tamme recently graduated from the police academy and are now beginning their field training program. Upon successful completion both will be released to solo patrol. These added officers will








### Excellence in Policing-Utilizing 21<sup>st</sup> Century Policing as a Guideline

Last year, we began featuring articles to address the six pillars of the Task Force on 21<sup>st</sup> Century Policing guidelines and recommendations for law enforcement agencies. This issue will focus on the fourth pillar, community policing and crime reduction.

Frankfort Police Department utilizes a community policing philosophy where our officers engage the community in important conversations, crime prevention efforts, and regularly communicate information to share with the public.

Our officers participated in over 21,000-foot patrols of businesses, parks, and other public areas last year. We also host events like Coffee with a Cop and Night Out Against Crime.

Frankfort Police Department has partnered with School District 157-C to provide a District Resource Officer (DRO) to the schools. The DRO fosters positive relationships with staff and students, assists the school staff with safety programs and drills, and protects students while on school grounds.

Frankfort Police Department hosts an Explorer Program (Cadet Program) which provides an opportunity for youth to participate in police community events and learn various skills related to law enforcement.

Chief John Burica has developed Directed Patrol Officer positions to address specific crime trends, community concerns, and provide additional patrol resources as needed.

The Frankfort Police Department has various crime prevention programs for older adults such as TRIAD, Seniors on Patrol, and Matter of Balance- Fall Prevention Program.

#### 2020: Our Agency's Response

As the year has come to an end, we realize it was difficult and trying time not just for us but for the community. The COVID19 epidemic created uncertainty and many obstacles for everyone. We had to filter through various streams of information to make decisions that would keep our community members and officers safe. We knew that when we took an oath to protect and serve, this service does not stop on holidays, during certain hours of the day, no matter the call, no matter the weather we are here for our community. We are here to serve and protect 24/7, 365 days a year and this holds true even in a pandemic.

Our officers rose to the challenge and showed up dutifully for work even with the fear of the unknown brought on by the pandemic. Chief Burica and Command Staff members spent countless hours on video conferences to develop safety protocols, securing PPE for officers, and applying modified schedules to reduce the risk of infection. Procedures for report taking were modified and sanitizing practices were implemented for squad cars and the police department building. Overall, the planning and protocols were successful in keeping our officers safe while still providing quality service to our residents.

On May 25, 2020 George Floyd died while in the custody of the Minneapolis Police Department. This tragic incident was described by Chief John Burica as "vile, inexcusable, and sickening". Nationwide there were many protests, some peaceful, but others resulting in rioting and civil unrest. The Village of Frankfort had several peaceful protests. Due to communication between community leaders, those who organized the protests and our agency, several plans were implemented which allowed a safe space for these gatherings.

Now we are entering 2021, COVID19 and civil unrest is still plaguing our country. Division and civil unrest are still occurring, we hope we are rounding the corner but that is it yet to be known. Here is what we do know: Frankfort PD is here, ready to serve and protect. The Frankfort Community has shown tremendous support and respect to our agency for which we are grateful. We are and have always been here to learn and listen. We know that the criminal justice system is not perfect, and we are always open for dialogue to discuss and implement changes. We believe a partnership between the community and the police department is the foundation of law enforcement and we will continue to foster and enhance this relationship. We have seen the burden this year has put on those we serve, but also our officers. We are proud of the men and women of the Frankfort Police Department and our high standards and progressive polices. We look forward to carrying out our agency's mission, to serve and protect, in 2021.
